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MES All-You-Can-Eat Crab Feast/Meet-&-Greet J. KING'S Restaurant, Gambrills, Maryland

A Maryland Entomological Society All-You-Can-Eat Crab Feast/Meet-&-Greet will be held on **Sunday, 8 September 2013**, at J. KING'S Restaurant, 329 Gambrills Road, Gambrills, Maryland. The event is scheduled to begin at 3:00 p.m.

Come join fellow MES members for an All-You-Can-Eat Crab Feast/Meet-&-Greet. There are approximately 115 members in the Society. This is an opportunity to come out of the lab or field and get to know your fellow members. Please feel free to invite your spouse to this event. J. KING'S is centrally located between Baltimore, Washington, Annapolis, and Columbia. And if you are sports oriented, J. KING'S has an abundance of televisions on their walls. Note: Neither the Baltimore Ravens nor the Washington Redskins play on 8 September. (Their games are Baltimore Ravens@ Denver Broncos on Thursday, 5 September and Philadelphia Eagles @ Washington Redskins on Monday, 9 September).

Date and Time: Sunday, 8 September 2012; 3:00 p.m. until whenever (J. KING'S ends all-you-can-eat crabs at 9:00 p.m.)

Menu: The All-You-Can-Eat Crab Feast menu includes steamed hardshell Blue Crabs, *Callinectes sapidus* Rathbun (Decapoda: Portunidae); corn-on-the-cob, *Zea mays* Linneaus (Poales: Poaceae); and Maryland crab soup, *Soupa callinectes marylandica*.

J. KING'S purchases their hardshell crabs from close to 15 different purveyors. They are one of the largest purchasers of hardshell crabs in the region. They do everything within their power to ensure that each and every crab that they serve is fresh, heavy, and cooked to perfection.

Cost: The All-You-Can-Eat Crab Feast menu is \$28 per person. If you are not interested in eating steamed crabs, you can order off of the regular menu at regular prices. If you plan to attend, please contact Gene at ejscarp@comcast.net by Friday, 30 August 2013 to make a reservation. (Gene needs to give the restaurant a head count on 30 August for crab ordering purposes and for space allocation.) Also, please indicate if you will not be eating steamed crabs and will be ordering off the regular menu instead.

CRICKET CRAWL 2013 FRIDAY, 23 AUGUST 2013

Dear Nature Enthusiast,

The insects are singing! Have you heard them?

Last year 150 groups took part in the Cricket Crawl—an evening sound census of the insects singing in our region. Each group had 1-5 participants, and we recorded over 1900 species observations! It was a wonderful evening of song and citizen science.

Note the date on your calendar: Friday, 23 August 2013 (rain date the following night), from 8:15 pm – midnight, call your friends, plan a cricket party, and start listening.

This is an activity that you can do with friends and family in your own backyard, neighborhood, or local park. You listen for a minute or many minutes, and then send in your observations, which will be mapped online in real time. The data will help scientists understand these insects.

The eight species to be surveyed during Cricket Crawl 2012 are: <u>Crickets</u> (3)

Northern Fall Field Cricket – *Gryllus pennsylvanicus* Burmeister Jumping Bush Cricket – *Orocharis saltator* Uhler

Japanese Burrowing Cricket – *Velarifictorus micado* (Saussure) <u>Katydids</u> (5)

Greater Anglewing – *Microcentrum rhombifolium* (Saussure) Lesser Anglewing – *Microcentrum retinerve* (Burmeister) Oblong-winged Katydid – *Amblycorypha oblongifolia* (De Geer) Fork-tailed Katydid – *Scudderia furcata* Brunner Common True Katydid – *Pterophylla camellifolia* (Fabricius)

"KUDZU BUG, *MEGACOPTA CRIBRARIA*, FOUND IN MARYLAND"

A 16 July 2013 article in *UMD Right Now* reports that a new insect pest has been discovered in Maryland. The article entitled "Tracking the Kudzu Bug in Maryland" tells of the finding and surveying of the Kudzu Bug, *Megacopta cribraria* (Fabricius) (Hemiptera: Plataspidae).

The Kudzu Bug (or Bean Plataspid) was first spotted in the United States in Georgia in 2009 and has been spreading up the East Coast, devouring soybeans along the way. The insect was first discovered in Maryland this summer by Alan Leslie, an entomology Ph.D. candidate at the University of Maryland College Park. At present, the Kudzu Bug has been detected in Anne Arundel, Calvert, Charles, Prince George's, and St. Mary's Counties. BALTIMORE CBP INTERCEPTS FIRST IN PORT MEALYBUG

A 29 July 2013 U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) news release reports that a U.S. Department of Agriculture entomologist confirmed that CBP agriculture specialists at the Baltimore Washington International Thurgood Marshall Airport discovered a first in port mealybug when they intercepted *Maconellicoccus multipori* (Takahashi) (Hemiptera: Pseudococcidae). The agriculture specialists discovered the pest

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on 30 December 2012 while inspecting cherimoya (*Annona cherimola* Mill. [Annonaceae]) fruit found inside of a traveler's luggage. The insects were discovered on the fruit being carried by a passenger originating from India and arriving from the United Kingdom.
