Title: Status of wild native bee populations in Maryland Speaker: Sam Droege, Native Bee Lab, Wildlife Biologist, Patuxent Wildlife Research Center, USGS

Speaker Biography:

Sam Droege is a Wildlife Biologist at Patuxent Wildlife Research Center. Known in recent years as the "Bee Guy," Sam is an all-around naturalist and an exceptional birder. He is widely published in numerous journals and government publications and has been featured by NPR, BBC, and National Geographic among others. Sam has coordinated the North American Breeding Bird Survey Program, developed the North American Amphibian Monitoring Program, the BioBlitz, Cricket Crawl, and FrogwatchUSA programs, and worked on the design and evaluation of other monitoring programs. Currently he is developing an inventory and monitoring program for native bees and online identification guides for North American bees at www.discoverlife.org. His recent co-authored book "Bees, An Up-Close Look at Pollinators Around the World" (Voyageur, 2015) showcases the incredible diversity of native bees through superb photography. 

Symposium: Aquatic Invertebrates in a Metacommunity Framework: Linking Terrestrial and Aquatic Systems Organizers: Margaret E. Hartman, William O. Lamp, Kelly McIntyre, Sally Entrekin

Organisms living in terrestrial and aquatic ecosystems are highly connected through nutrient exchange and food web linkages.
